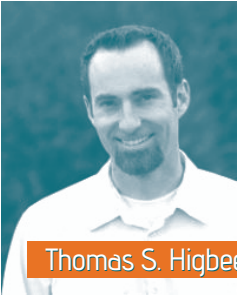


Dr. Joyanna Silberg

Dr. Joyanna Silberg, consulting psychologist at Sheppard Pratt Health System, is an international expert on dissociation in children and adolescents and past president of the International Society on the Study of Trauma and Dissociation. Her book, *The Child Survivor – Healing Developmental Trauma and Dissociation*, is a clinically rich, comprehensive overview of the treatment of children and adolescents who have developed dissociative symptoms in response to ongoing developmental trauma. This work, her service as executive vice president of the Leadership Council on Child Abuse & Interpersonal Violence, her consultation for DVLEAP’s

Custody and Abuse Project with the Office on Violence Against Women, and her analysis of cases in which judicial decisions imperil children culminate in making her a widely respected authority in the field. Dr. Silberg is a recipient of numerous awards and recognitions and we are honored to have her join us as a key faculty member to provide invaluable insights into trauma, dissociation, system issues, and more.

Dr. Thomas S. Higbee is professor of special education and rehabilitation at Utah State University where he has worked since 2002. He is also director of the Autism Support Services: Education, Research, and Training (ASSERT) program, an early intensive behavioral intervention program for children with autism which he founded in 2003. His research interests include strategies for promoting verbal behavior, social behavior, and independence in individuals with autism and related disabilities as well as the functional assessment and treatment of aberrant behavior. He is an

associate editor for the *Journal of Applied Behavior Analysis (JABA)* and has served on the board of editors for a variety of other behavioral journals. Throughout his career, he has worked with children with autism and related disabilities in home-, center-, and school-based programs. Through workshops and consultation, he has trained teachers and related service providers in schools throughout the U.S. and has provided international training in Brazil and Russia.

Dr. Higbee also leads a grant-funded research project on computer-based training of behavior analytic teaching procedures for special education teachers and related service providers. The skills and perspectives Dr. Higbee will provide are sure to make a positive impact in your practice!

HOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS

APPLIED SUICIDE INTERVENTION SKILLS TRAINING (ASIST)

ASIST – a two-day (13 CE hours for most disciplines) interactive workshop in suicide first-aid, provides ways to reduce immediate risks of suicide and increase supports for persons at-risk. It is suitable for all kinds of caregivers – health and mental health professionals, teachers, community workers, youth workers, volunteers, people responding to family, friends and co-workers.

This program will be hosted by, and conducted at, the University of Utah Neuropsychiatric Institute. Certified trainers from the Utah National Guard,

Utah Navajo Health System, and other entities are partnering to offer this program. **Attendance both days is required for CE credit and ASIST Certification.** Space will be limited so early registration is recommended. The content may be difficult if you are feeling emotionally vulnerable, if you have suicidal thoughts, or have been recently

bereaved. In such cases, you may wish to delay taking the course until you are feeling stronger. (Limited scholarships are available from the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. For information contact Kim Myers – kmyers@utah.gov.)

TRAUMA-FOCUSED COGNITIVE BEHAVIORAL THERAPY (TF-CBT)

TF-CBT is a short-term, evidence-based treatment for children, ages 3 to 18, who have experienced trauma and their caregivers. This components-based psychotherapy model incorporates trauma-sensitive interventions with cognitive behavioral, family, and humanistic principles. TF-CBT is empirically supported for use with youth impacted by trauma and co-occurring mental health problems. It is designated a Model Program by SAMHSA's National Child Traumatic Stress Network (NCTSN) and has received the highest scientific rating as a Well-Supported-Effective Practice by the California Evidence-Based Clearinghouse for Child Welfare. Clinical research shows that TF-CBT significantly reduces children's symptoms of PTSD and improves overall mental health in children and caregivers.

This two-day pre-conference training will provide you with a comprehensive understanding of TF-CBT as well as hands-on opportunities to practice TF-CBT components such as

- **P**sychoeducation & Parenting Strategies
- **R**elaxation
- **A**ffective Expression & Regulation
- **C**ognitive Coping
- **T**rauma Narrative & Processing
- **I**n Vivo Exposure
- **C**onjoint Parent Child Sessions
- **E**nhancing Personal Safety & Future Growth

As a result of participating in this program, you will be able to:

- Identify & engage children and families who would benefit from TF-CBT;
- Describe the treatment components and underlying rationale for each component;
- Develop & practice skills to implement each treatment component;
- Learn several approaches for helping children create a narrative of their traumatic experience(s);
- Apply strategies for addressing distorted / unhelpful trauma-related cognitions; and,
- Address common barriers to treatment implementation.

Because of the high-demand for this training and the even higher demand for certified TF-CBT clinicians, this program will only be open to **twenty-five individuals intent on pursuing certification via follow-up consultation**. Thus, registration for this program includes twelve monthly consult calls which will be scheduled at the time of the training. Participation in at least nine of the twelve calls is required to be eligible for certification.

This program is provided via a generous partnership with Primary Children's Hospital, Safe & Healthy Families Program and will be hosted at the University of Utah Neuropsychiatric Institute.
